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rhetoric the theory of oral discourse affected and indeed pervaded all aspects of classical thought bearing the stamp of its impact were the homeric hymns the iliad and the odyssey aeschylus eumenides the great dramatic tragedies the elegiac and lyric poetry and the literature of the romans often formed in the greek image the rhetorical notion of probability had direct implications for the classical philosopher and mathematician as it does today departments of speech english philosophy and classics provide the key centers of interest in the new and the classical rhetorics despite the considerable enthusiasm for the study of rhetoric no single work provides large selections of primary materials written by the classical rhetoricians themselves until now only secondary sources containing tiny excerpts or entire and expensive translations of the ancient rhetorical writings were available this large anthology of primary readings of the classical rhetoricians in translation fills this large gap the continuity and coherence of ancient rhetorical traditions is emphasized by organizing large excerpts into the topical divisions that later classical writers agreed upon the first unit of this anthology sets forth major issues in the definition and scope of rhetoric and its appropriate place among other modes of thought and discourse parts 2 through 5 are organized according to the traditional canons of oratory invention disposition style memory and delivery in organizing the readings this way the editors represent both the philosophical and theoretical issues in rhetoric and its pragmatic functions as a craft for making effective discourse selecting excerpts that illustrate the major conflicts within the unfolding tradition enables a sampling of not only the major points of view but also the arguments supporting them this volume includes selections not only from writings of the standard classical rhetoricians but also from less typical works which have special value the editors have utilized the best accessible translations while remaining absolutely faithful to their texts

the resurgence of interest in rhetoric among political theorists is one of the most remarkable developments in the field over the past few decades assembling a multidisciplinary group of prominent scholars the oxford handbook of rhetoric and political theory is the most ambitious effort to date to display the range and vitality of work that constitutes the rhetorical turn in political theory including thirty six chapters across five sections the handbook explores issues that reside at the heart of many of the most pivotal debates and discussions in political theory today questions about the role of affect and emotion in political life the work of persuasion in political discourse the relationship between logic and style in political argument the character and scope of public deliberation the performative and constitutive dimensions of language the play of contingency in political life and the rhetorical structure of political texts the volume s authors assess the changing status of rhetoric in political theory and philosophy exploring disputes that arose in ancient athens and have continued to the present day as well as urgent

issues that have only recently emerged moreover the handbook investigates different understandings of rhetoric that have animated recent scholarship and examines key issues and approaches that have fueled the burgeoning interest in rhetoric and political thought the oxford handbook of rhetoric and political theory demonstrates that an adequate understanding of political affairs cannot be attained without taking account the impact of rhetoric on political thought and conduct

rhetorical hermeneutics asks whether rhetorical theory can function as a general hermeneutic a master key to texts the dazzling central essay by dilip parameshwar gaonkar questions rhetoric s globally interpretive status gaonkar begins with the ubiquity of rhetoric it is a habit of our time to invoke rhetoric time and again to make sense of a wide variety of discursive practices that beset and perplex us and of discursive artifacts that annoy and entertain us and of discursive formations that inscribe and subjugate us rhetoric is a way of reading the endless discursive debris that surrounds us starting from the work of john angus campbell alan gross and lawrence prelli on the rhetoric of science gaonkar broadens his critique to fundamental issues for any rhetorical theory and develops four questions that cut to the heart of the possibility of a post modern rhetoric how can rhetoric an art traditionally directed toward practice transform itself into hermeneutic theory a mode of reading does contemporary rhetorical theory have legitimate

theoretical status can an intentional strategic theory of rhetoric survive the poststructuralist postmodernist critique is the case study the centerpiece of rhetorical and ethnographic scholarship epistemologically robust enough to bear the weight of a discipline representing a variety of disciplines contributors to this volume include m left d mccloskey j a campbell a gross s fuller c miller c willard j jasinski w keith d kaufer a king and t farrell in a pellucid final essay a close reading of the third kind gaonkar responds to his critics

setting out the principles of rhetoric with a wide range of illustrative examples in the first chapter the author then explores rhetoric at work in different genres via a close reading of texts
